SAINTS DAY CALENDAR

September 27th is the calendar date for Vincent de Paul. Some know of the Saint Vincent de Paul Society at churches today that minister to the poor. In 1600 Vincent was ordained. In 1605 while he was sailing from Marseilles to Toulouse, his ship was captured by brigands. He was sold into slavery and eventually became a member of the household of a lapsed Christian, who later repented and released Vincent. Queen Margaret of Valois made him her chaplain, which brought him to Paris where he became the tutor to Count Philip de Gondi's children. Due to his time as a slave, Vincent had delivered a great empathy for the poor. He now used his contacts in the court and high society to help the poor. He was first helped by the Countess de Gondi with funds to start his mission of aide and received funds from many rich women in Paris to open hospitals for the sick, including one at Marseilles for galley-slaves. As an intimate advisor to the French royal family, he was able to start relief work among the poor. He died at the age of 85 in the year 1660.

THE ARDANROE HERBARIUM

CARNATION

The name Carnation has been applied to many related species over its history. It belongs to the *Dianthus* genus of which there are 300 species. Not to mention all the hybrids.

Dianthus comes from the Greek for either heavenly flower or the flower of Jove. The name carnation is thought to have come from its use in ceremonial crowns while others think it comes from the Latin "caro" for flesh (referring to the flower's original color). Common names include carnation (*D. caryophyllus*), pink (*D. plumarius* and related species) and Sweet William (*D. barbatus*). It was also known as clove carnations or clove gillyflowers. *Dianthus* was cited by Theophrastus, the Greek botanist.

Although the species are largely perennial herbs, you will find a few that are annual and even biennial, with some being low shrubs with woody stems. While this is a perennial, in our area it is treated as an annual due its short life. The leaves are simple, opposite, mainly linear, and the color is often strongly gray-green to blue-green. The flowers have five petals, often with a frilled or pinked margin, and are (in almost all species) pale to dark pink. One species, *D. knappii*, has yellow flowers with a purple center. The color of hybrids is another matter altogether including green, red, yellow, and white. The color pink gets its name not so much from the color of the plant as much as from the shape of the petal edges: pink as in pinking shears. Because carnations cannot produce the pigment delphinidin there cannot be a natural occurring blue carnation. This is a trait that carnations share with roses, lilies, and chrysanthemums. About 1996, thanks to genetic manipulation involving the petunia and snapdragon, a blue-mauve carnation trademarked Moondust was created quickly followed by a violet carnation called Moonshadow. Other shadings have followed these.

Its planetary ruler is Jupiter.

Dianthus genus is mainly native to Europe and Asia though its exact range is unknown due to extensive cultivation for the last 2,000 years. A few species extend south to North Africa while one species (*D. repens*) is found in arctic North America.

Gerard recommends a compost of clove gillyflowers for most heart ailments while Culpepper recommends one regularly consume either the syrup or the conserve of clove gillyflowers for improvement of general health and especially for hot pestilent fevers and to expel poisons.

The fragrance can be capture in syrup to be used in cordials or for desserts.

Most of the meanings that are commonly applied to carnations are from the Victorian era. The meaning was dependent on the color: light red for admiration, dark red for deep love or affection, white for pure love or good

luck, striped for regret, and purple for flighty and unpredictable. In France, carnations are the traditional funeral flower that is often given as a condolence. This has led to it being seen as a flower of misfortune and bad luck. Since 1907 it has been worn on Mother's Day. It was the favorite flower of Anna Jarvis. This custom has changed over time to wearing red for a living mother and white for a deceased mother. In Korea, red and pink carnations are worn on Parents Day and Teacher Day. In Austria, Italy, and the former Yugoslavia, a red carnation is worn on May Day. In Portugal, a red carnation is worn to honor the Carnation Revolution. Naturally, green carnations have been favored on St. Patrick Day. Because it was so often worn by Oscar Wilde in the first half of the 20th century it came to symbolize homosexuality. Ohio selected the scarlet carnation to honor William McKinley who regularly wore one. Former Ohio governor, President McKinley was assassinated in 1901.

LESSONS IN HERALDRY

Seme! We of Ardanroe love our seme! And in the *April 2010 Letters of Acceptance and Returns* a clarification on the rules regarding one use of a seme was asked and answered. Hear the ruling from the Wreath Sovereign of Arms.

From Wreath: Divided Fields, Tinctures, and Strewn Charges¹

A submission this month asked for clarification on the subject of strewn charges on only part of a plain field. The LoI quoted the following precedents:

[Per bend sinister argent and argent semy-de-lys sable, on a bend sinister gules a sword inverted Or, in chief an elephant head cabossed sable] Current precedent disallows strewn charges on only part of a plain field, even when the field has a “natural” division such as an ordinary (see July 1998 LoAR, Miriel MacGregor), barring evidence that such fields were used in period armory. [Bohémond le Sinistre, 01/2001, Outlands]

and

[*Per chevron pean and sable, on a chevron Or ...*] It was the consensus of the College that a divided field in which the two parts are tinctures that share the same background is allowable if there is an ordinary to aid in the separation of the two parts, though the practice is not documented. [Thorgrimr inn kyrri, 02/2001, Atlantia]

The difference between the two is that an ordinary or other natural division is allowed to correct the style problem for tinctures, but not for strewn charges. Tinctures, even the ermined furs, are considered a single entity, not a field with charges strewn upon them. Charges may not be strewn on only one half of a divided field, even in the presence of an ordinary dividing the halves, when the halves share the same background tincture.

What does this mean to us? Tinctures are gold, silver, blue, green, black, red, and sable (under their heraldic names). Furs are representations of ermine and squirrel. The commonly used ones are ermine (black ermine spots on silver), pean (gold ermine spots on black), erminois (black ermine spots on gold), and counter-ermine (white ermine spots on black), and vair and potent (blue and gold in two varying designs). You can create other combinations of ermine but must specifically blazon these (ex: gold ermined red = red ermine spots on gold). And there are some other fur-like ones we will not get into at this time. Anyway, what this means is that ‘furs’ are treated as tinctures. Thus if you wanted to divide the field of your device into parts that are black and black with gold ermine spots (pean), you could if you used an ordinary to separate each part from the other (ordinaries being a cross throughout, saltire, chevron, pale, fess, pall, bend, bend sinister). However, if you wanted to divide the field of your device into parts that are red and red crusilly gold (this is a red field with lots of gold crosses strewn upon it), even if you used an ordinary to separate each part from the other, it would be returned because one is a tincture, red, and the other is a semy not a fur and thus not considered a tincture. You just have a field that is red with some of it having little gold crosses on it. That will not be registered based on the clarification above.

If you have a particular heraldry question you would like answered in “Lessons in Heraldry”, please let me know! I may not know the answer but will try to find an answer that helps.
